Thoughts for further study:

Have you ever dismissed someone who asked you about 'spiritual' things, and later regretted your actions? What did you do?

What lessons can we gain from the parable of the persistent widow in Luke 18?

The official had great faith even though he had not believed. Can such great faith also be a deterrent to trusting in Christ for salvation?

The Jewish leaders could defeat a person's faith by their emphasis on the law. Are there rules, laws, or customs that we (you) practice which could defeat someone's desire to know the Savior?
